BENDIGO BANK

The Club has formed a partnership with the local Bendigo Community Bank. Local communities started to form community banks when the major banks started to close branches leaving areas like Hurstbridge, Kinglake and Diamond Creek without a local bank branch.

Using the banking license, government guarantee and computer systems of the Bendigo Adelaide Bank, the local community bank was formed in 2001. This franchise has its own local shareholders and operates the Bendigo Bank branches in Eltham, Hurstbridge, Kinglake, Diamond Creek, Mernda and Doreen.

The most impressive aspect of the local Community Bank is the policy to distribute 80% of the franchise profits to local community groups. The Eltham Bowling Club has received nearly \$6000 in recent years under this policy. In total, the franchise has distributed nearly \$6 million since 2001 covering a wide selection of sporting clubs and community organizations.

When presenting the many cheques, the volunteer bank Chairman, Barry Henwood, makes the point that the financial distribution depends on the Bank being profitable and encourages everyone to consider the local Bendigo branch for their banking and insurance needs.

After the revelations of the Banking Royal Commission, if you want to do business with a Bank you can be proud of, then the Eltham branch of the Bendigo Bank is the obvious alternative.


Feature Article - Club Finances

It was felt by the Board, that the following two pie charts, would help our members understand what activities keep us in the black, despite the rising financial costs of running a club such as ours.


As you can see, if we were relying on Members' fees alone, these would have to be a lot higher. At the moment we are managing to keep annual fee rises to CPI.



Umpire's Corner

"Touchers"

A "toucher" is a bowl that has touched the jack in its initial delivery motion, either directly or from a deflection ("wick") off another bowl. The bowl must be marked as a toucher before the next bowl comes to rest. Spray chalk is the preferred method to mark a bowl as



a toucher. As long as they are within the bounds of the rink then a toucher is still a live bowl if it has come to rest in the ditch. The position of a live bowl in the ditch must be marked by the yellow marker on the bank. (White marker for the jack in the ditch.)

Pre Pennant Practice:

On any match Saturday members of the home sides may practice on their home greens until 12:30, provided that practice is not on any part of a rink allocated to their game that day. You cannot practice at an away venue on that day.

No practice is allowed on Tuesdays before pennant games.

From the Bowls Victoria Conditions of Play Document....

Saturday Pennant

- 8.1 Prior to half an hour before the commencement time, the home team may practice on any rink other than the rinks or part of the rinks allocated to them for the match including east west or on the pegs if the match is to be played north south and vice versa if the game is played east west.
- 8.2 Visiting sides are not permitted to practice at the away venues on the day of competition.

Tuesday Pennant

5.1 Pre-match practice is not permitted other than the two trial ends.

Austin Health Opportunity Shop, Diamond Creek Auxiliary

Two mornings a week, I volunteer at the Austin Health Opportunity Shop in Diamond Creek, just over the railway line on the right, on the Main Hurstbridge Road.

The Op Shop sells good quality donated clothing, furniture, homeware, toys, books and other goods at low cost to the people of Nillumbik Shire (I handle the DVDs and CDs).





We then use the funds raised to buy essential medical equipment for Austin Health, such as cardiac monitors, ECG machines, kidney dialysis machines, electric wheelchairs etc

Over 50 volunteers work at the shop from Monday to Saturday each week, and new volunteers are always welcome.

The Diamond Creek Auxiliary started in 1973 and moved to its present site at 42/44 Main Hurstbridge Road, Diamond Creek in 1981.

The original building has a Heritage Overlay on it, as it was one of the earliest buildings in Diamond Creek. It became a Grocery and Green Grocery Store in 1912, and later an electrical repair shop and an estate agency, among other things.

However, it was condemned as unsafe in late 2011, and closed. Fortunately though, an anonymous benefactor soon after donated enough money to restore the building.

A new building was also erected next to the old one.



Today, the Austin Health Op Shop is a focal point of the local community. We have well over 100 visitors a day, and many of them benefit from the bargains at the shop. This in turn helps raise the health standard of the community in the Austin Hospital area


