Forty/40

The second series of a very successful Forty/40 season was completed last Friday night. Thank you to the large group of Eltham members who have made Forty/40 possible. We have recently learnt that we are one of only a small number of clubs that has run a successful Forty/40 program, a compliment to Leon Sinnott's pioneering team last year and Scott Jarred's team this year.

The Century Handicap: Is it unfair, and if so, to whom?

Occasionally it has been said that the maximum handicap of 30 is far too big, it's unfair. On the surface, this complaint seems reasonable; surely 30 is a big number? But when we look more closely, I believe we will see this is not so.

Firstly, let's consider the <u>purpose</u> of a handicap event. Such events are far from rare in other sports, for example amateur golf, professional athletics (e.g. Stawell Gift), most horse races, etc. The aim is surely to give all competitors a fairly equal chance of winning. Thus the weaker players (horses) are given some help.

How has this worked out in our men's Century Handicap competition? Over the last five years, of all matches, 60% have been won by the player with the bigger handicap. Even more telling, the winner has always come from players in the top two Saturday pennant teams, never from players in the bottom two teams.

Why is this so? Some simple arithmetic may help explain.

In each end, the closest four bowls are scored 4,3,2,1 (a total of 10). The first player to reach 100 plus their handicap wins. For example, if on a 30 handicap, they must start at minus 30.

Let us suppose two players, one from the top pennant team on a 30 handicap, the other from the bottom team on 0. Let us make the supposition that <u>on average</u> the more skilful player gets 6 to the other's 4, per end. This is surely a reasonable assumption; indeed I would expect the average margin to be bigger.

After 15 ends in this game the scores will be 60 - 60. That is, they are level. After 22 ends, the adjusted scores are 102 to 88. The top-team player wins easily!

Thus I think that far from 30 being too much of a handicap for a Division 1 player, both the evidence of past results plus the mathematics involved suggest that perhaps 30 should become 40, or even 50.
